

The Gothic Tower and Potomac

In 1861 Baron Lionel de Rothschild extended Gunnersbury Park by purchasing 331 acres from the Bishop of London. In the south west corner of this newly enlarged estate was a huge



former clay pit called Cole's Hole. To the side of the pit sat a disused tile kiln. Although this was the only clay pit on the estate there were other clay pits close by; these have since been built on. The area is now known as Clayponds Estate.

Lionel de Rothschild re-landscaped Cole's Hole to form a picturesque boating lake which he renamed the Potomac Pond. The old tile kiln was then very cleverly converted to a tower-cum-boathouse folly.

The man responsible for the design and creation of the Potomac Pond and Gothic Tower was J.W.Pulham. Pulham, being from a family of gardener/architects, had developed a type of artificial stone which he had subsequently patented under the name Pulhamite. This type of artificial stone can be seen around the arched boat inlet and island at the bottom tower.

In its heyday the tower which is an octagonal building mounted on a square basement, would have had leaded windows in the upper gallery. The tower would have been externally rendered and the remains of the stucco heads can still be seen on each side of the three arches on the ground floor.

The tower has three floors: the lowest being at the level of the pond with a grotto-like arched inlet for a single pleasure boat. A narrow spiral staircase leads to the ground floor a vaulted chamber and then up into the light and spacious upper gallery. This gallery would have been used as an observation room from which the picturesque surroundings of Potomac could be seen.

The tower at one point also functioned as a bell tower. The bell was presumably rung to alert the distant household staff of the returning boating party.

Since Gunnersbury became a public park, the Potomac has become a popular fishing lake. Carp up to 24lb, and Pike up to 34lb have been caught along with Perch, Roach, and the occasional Eel. The Carp can often be seen basking in shoals near the surface on sunny days. Other wildlife often seen in this area are the wildfowl such as Tufted ducks, Mallard ducks, Little Grebe's, Great Crested Grebes, Moorhens, Coots and of course Canadian Geese. You may also see Woodpeckers, Tree Creepers and Longtailed Tits fluttering amongst the tree tops. During the Summer look out for the Dragonflies (who sit with their wings open) and the Damsel flies (who sit with their wings closed) darting across the water along with a number of different butterflies including the Peacock, Tortoiseshell, Meadow Brown and Orange Tip. Of course the Potomac wouldn't seem like a part of the park if it didn't have its most common vertebrate - the Grey Squirrel.




