

There is a very large Japanese community living and working in west London which will be involved in the year-long, nationwide cultural festival "Japan 2001".

As part of this festival, Liam O'Brien and Phillida Purvis have formed a group to raise funds for the restoration of Gunnersbury's Japanese Garden, and already there has been some interest in newspapers and on television in Japan.

At the same time, studies are being done on how to use the derelict land north of the Stables (backing onto the Garden) as the site for Kyodo (Japanese ritual archery) and perhaps a small Japanese cultural centre. We are hoping that reports on this will be ready for the September meeting of the Gunnersbury Park Committee, when we will be able to bring Friends further news. We are supporting Liam and Phillida with their work – they are bringing exciting possibilities to the Park.

Gunnersbury Park Museum has established a popular programme of special events for visitors over the past three years. To build on this success they have secured funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund and the Millennium Festival as part of Museums and Galleries Month 2000. This will help to provide activities in the galleries on a regular basis. Twice a month (increasing to twice a week during school holidays) visitors can drop in and explore the past through objects, hands-on activities and a museum interpreter. It is designed to appeal to all visitors and especially to encourage family learning in museums.

SMALL MANSION ARTS CENTRE

Over the last ten years SMAC has delivered its educational activities in a variety of roles. The emphasis in the curriculum is to provide a creative working experience for students of any age and at any educational level.

Currently there are thirteen classes which take place every day and evening at the Small Mansion. Five of the classes are tutored by SMAC tutors, including drawing, painting and sculpture. There are also six adult education classes run by Ealing Tertiary College which use the Small Mansion facilities for drawing, watercolour and ceramic painting. There is also a class run by a local arts society. There are now approximately 200 Ealing and Hounslow residents visiting Gunnersbury Park to attend classes at SMAC every week.

The SMAC classes are organised in ten-week 'modules', repeated without breaks. This policy was adopted at the request of their students, who prefer this regular schedule.

Some of their students are beginners in the visual arts who want to experiment with formal training in an informal environment, where the only prerequisite for classes is willingness and interest.

Many of their students pursue art as an ongoing interest, returning to classes year after year. Some of their students have been attending classes for ten years.

For those students who are pursuing higher education, the Small Mansion Arts Centre has provided valuable pre-foundation opportunities. Their students have gone on to further and higher education courses at Glasgow School of Art, The Kent Institute, Farnham College of Art, Chelsea School of Art, the universities of East London and Brighton, Thames Valley University and Central St. Martin's College of Art.

'GOINGS ON AT GUNNERSBURY'

Walks and Talks are being prepared for Gunnersbury Park, concentrating on the history of the buildings in the Park, with additional details of its garden history. Marina Pacheco of the Community Initiative Partnerships is hoping to begin the programme of Walks next month. Marina also reports that the reconstruction of Princess Amelia's Bath House is well under way. The restoration is extensive and will take some time. The surroundings of the Round Pond are being re-landscaped. A plan of this work is currently on display in the North Lodge Information Centre.

Plans for the re-landscaped Italian Garden will be open to public consultation shortly. Anyone who is interested is invited to come and inspect the plans and give the CIP their opinion. This will then be relayed to the landscape architect in charge of the project. The number of Ground Staff in the Park has been increased by two, to seven. They have recently been engaged in the formidable task of getting the bindweed under control.
